Thomas Abrams is a postdoctoral fellow at OISE/University of Toronto's Department of Social Justice Education. There are three themes that he has pursued as of late. First, he is interested in the phenomenological philosophical tradition, and how disability is explored (or more often, ignored) therein. The two other themes stem from this philosophical interest, exploring how disability is managed through income and labour support policy, and the micropolitics of rehabilitation therapy. This work draws from many different resources, ranging from the abstract philosophical work of Martin Heidegger, to empirical policy studies, and his own personal experience of muscular dystrophy.

Jason Bryant defended his PhD dissertation at the Arizona State University and graduated in December 2013. The dissertation, *Queering Home: Domestic Space and Sexuality in Postmodern American Literature*, reflects his research interests in theories of space, domesticity, and sexuality. His research interests include: mediation and conflict resolution, prevention of homophobia, juvenile delinquency, community and normative violence, social identity and intergroup relations, psycho-sexology and LGBT studies. He has widely conferenced and written for national and international readers.

Amith Kumar PV is an Associate Professor in the Department of Comparative Literature and Indian Studies, The English and Foreign Languages University, Hyderabad, India. He has been a Fulbright Visting Fellow at Portland State University, Oregon, USA from August 2007 to June 2008. He has published research articles in international journals, mainly on Mikhail Bakhtin's dialogic principles, with a focus on their extension and appropriation in the context of "Indian literatures." He has presented papers in international conferences in Denmark, Finland, Greece, the USA, and the UK. He has delivered several keynote addresses at national conferences in India. His areas of research specialization include Bakhtin Studies, Comparative Literary Studies, Translation Studies and

Disability Studies. Currently, he is the principal director of the Indian Council of Social Sciences Research sponsored special project on Disability Studies in India. His book titled *Bakhtin and Translation Studies: Theoretical Extensions* will be published by Cambridge Scholars Publishing in February 2015.

Allison Moore is a senior lecturer in Early Childhood Studies and Sociology at Edge Hill University, Ormskirk, England. Her research interests include sexual politics, sexual citizenship and the regulation of sexuality, especially the regulation of youth sexuality.

Stanimir Panayotov graduated in Philosophy from Sofia University and holds MA in Philosophy and Gender Studies from Euro-Balkan Institute (2011) with a thesis on Plato's natural philosophy and the problem of femininity/maternity in the ancient concept of space (*khôra*).
